





Uncover the secrets of a small town


The birthplace of bourbon? Possibly.

- Travel 28 miles north to walk in the footsteps of Noah himself at the the one-of-akind and historically themed Ark Encounter.


Come while away a day or three in a small town with a mix of marquee attractions, including Yuko-en on the Elkhorn, Country Boy Brewing, Evans Orchard & Cider Mill, and a Victorian-era downtown alive with shops, galleries and restaurants, and hidden assets like a 1917 Rosenwald School, two equestrian-themed art galleries showcasing the works of John Stephen Hockensmith and Robert Clark, and Heirlooms & Gretchen's, one of Kentucky's only authentic stained glass shops.

Old Friends Thoroughbred Retirement Farm

Get to know, feed and pet champion race horses at horse racing's living history museum. Old Friends cares for a herd of over 175 horses – mostly ones whose racing and breeding careers have ended – giving them the coddling and attention that rivals that of their former glory days. You may find yourself feeding a carrot to 1997 Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner Silver Charm or getting kissed and tickled on the hand by Popcorn Deelites, the equine star of the 2003 Academy Award-nominated "Seabiscuit." Among the rock stars of the turf at this working farm are Breeders' Cup champion Alphabet Soup; Belmont Stakes winner Touch Gold; and War Emblem, another Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner. 502-863-1775 | oldfriendsequine.org

Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky

Take a **complimentary** tram ride through Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky, an auto-building "theme park" where live and robotic workers zip around partially constructed cars, installing wheels, dropping in speakers or carburetors, moving forklifts and more as they construct cars from the ground up. Strap yourself into a NASCAR simulator to careen around a racetrack. Ward Hall

At Ward Hall, learn about the exploits of sassy, brassy Sallie Ward, who once

stripped down to her "birthday suit" at a party attended by Boston's uppercrust. Ward Hall Preservation Foundation board chair, Ron Bryant, squires visitors on a journey among the skeletons in the closets of this circa 1850s antebellum home – one of the finest Greek Revival-style mansions in the United States and described by a descendant as "a veritable palace, surrounded by a fairy garden." 502-863-5356 | wardhall.net



Ark Encounter

Its hulking girth rising from the Williamstown landscape – 30 minutes north of Georgetown – this massive and immersive Noah's Ark is truly an attraction



of biblical proportions, the specs for building it coming straight from the Good Book: 300 cubits long by 50 cubits wide by 30 cubits high. (A cubit is approximately equal to the length of a forearm.) That's 500 feet long, 85 feet wide and 51 feet high, making Ark Encounter the world's largest timber-frame structure. 855-284-3275 | arkencounter.com

A walk through time

Georgetown has five Nationally Register Historic Districts and a beautifully preserved Victorianera downtown – one of the most picturesque in Kentucky. A self-guided, 2-mile walking tour showcases the more than 200 downtown buildings and homes listed on the National Register of Historic Places, many of which house antique and specialty shops and restaurants, including the old post office, now home of the Georgetown/Scott County Museum, and the 1892 jail, now the Scott County Arts & Cultural Welcome Center. 

Each offers a unique experience: Bi Water Farm & Greenhouse, known as the "Disney of central Kentucky farms"; Elmwood Stock Farm, featuring "From the Ground Up" tours; Evans Orchard & Cider Mill, the only farm in central Kentucky with a cider mill; and Triple J Farm, where visitors can see produce sorted and packaged in the building where it is sold.

Baptist college has ties to bourbon

In the late 1700s, Baptist minister Rev. Elijah Craig was very busy in the area: first founding a classical school in 1788, establishing the first grist mill and paper mill; discovering and then distilling bourbon in 1789; and founding the Rittenhouse Academy in 1798 as a land grant school for the community. This 52- acre campus eventually became Georgetown College, a small, private Christian liberal arts college. Chartered in 1829, it became the first Baptist college west of the Allegheny Mountains.
