Elijah Craig wasn't just the founder of bourbon, but the founder of Georgetown as well, although in 1764, it was known as Lebanon. The renaming as George Town came in 1790 to honor President George Washington.

You're never far from history here. From a Thoroughbred owner's antebellum home to the first Toyota plant in the United States, Georgetown's past has been rich and varied.

The 1857 Greek Revival Ward Hall is said to be the largest house in Kentucky, whose owner spared no expense in making it a showplace. Learn about Ward Hall's very own Scarlett O'Hara – the Belle of the Bluegrass and a fashion icon who never had to make a dress out of curtains.

A new kind of history began in 1988 with the opening of Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky which gave our small Kentucky town international status. Check out Georgetown's cultural ties with Japan at Yuko-en on the Elkhorn, a five-and-a-half-acre traditional Japanese garden.

In 1877, the former railroad town known as Big Eagle, owing to its location on Eagle Creek, was renamed to honor Mrs. Sarah "Sadie" Emison Pack for her efforts in helping the railroading construction crews that set up their base of operations in this crossroads community. One hundred forty-five years after its founding, Sadieville is a quiet community with its downtown listed on the National Register of Historic Places, including landmarks such as the Sadieville Train Depot and Rosenwald School.

Stamping Ground, Kentucky was named for a noise: the stamping of hundreds of hooves of eager buffalo waiting to drink from Buffalo Spring which created one of Kentucky's three major bowl-shaped basin. Over time, as local residents and industries made use of the spring, the area became known for its historic landmarks, including the Alexander Bradford House and the Buffalo Spring Distillery which remained in operation until 1968.

Situated in the midst of Central Kentucky's Thoroughbred horse country, Georgetown is the perfect place to indulge your passion for horses. Whether it's watching a mare cavort with her frisky foal in a sort of equine ballet (who knows, you may be getting a look at a future Kentucky Derby champion); letting breeds ranging from the sturdy English shire to the dainty Paso Fino put on a show for you at the Kentucky Horse Park, or paying your respects to retired racehorses at Old Friends (be forewarned – make sure you have plenty of carrots and sugar cubes on hand), Georgetown is horse heaven.


